Dear Parents, Staff and Students,

Formation Goal: For the students to gain a broader understanding of prayer. For the students to improve in their reading and writing. Literacy Goal:


Numeracy Goal: For all students to develop in their ability to interpret questions.

Children's School Books Coming Home

Starting next Friday 6th March all students will be bringing their Literacy book home. We commenced the practice of sending children's school books home last year and had very good feedback from parents appreciating the opportunity to view their child's learning. I know that many children were excited about the feedback that they had received from their parents.

We encourage you to talk to your child about his/her work. Parents may find it useful to ask the five key questions that the leadership team use when they visit classrooms on their instructional walks:

- ♦ What are you learning?
- ♦ How are you doing?
- ♦ How do you know?
- ♦ How can you improve?
- ♦ Where do you go for help?
- ♦ What new skills have you learnt?
- Are there areas that you would like to improve in and why?

Parents are invited to write a comment in your child's book after the last piece of work. eg, Wonderful effort! I loved reading your stories. I can see that you are using some very descriptive words. I love the way that you are sounding out your words/using capital letters and full stops. Well done on explaining synonyms/visualisation/persuasive language to me.

Behaviour Expectations

Over the past four weeks all the teachers have been talking about being a safe and a respectful learner. We hope that parents have been reinforcing this message at home.

Last week and this week we have been focused on our expectation – '**Right place, Right time**'. We expect all the students to be on their class lines at the morning assembly, after recess, after lunch and after school by the time the second bell rings.

The teachers on playground duty have been giving the students feedback as to how well each class has achieved the expectation. Ask your child to explain the feedback charts below of our week so far.







What is Bullying?

In the last newsletter parents were informed of the process of bully audits that are being regularly conducted in Stage 2 and Stage 3. The teachers revise with the students the behaviours of a bully prior to them completing these audits.

Bullying is when a person or a group do unkind things to someone, on purpose, **repeatedly** and the person being bullied finds it hard to stop it.

Behaviours that <u>do not</u> constitute bullying include:

- Mutual arguments and disagreements (where there is no power imbalance).
- Not liking someone or a single act of social rejection.
- One-off acts of meanness or spite.
- Isolated incidents of aggression, intimidation or violence.

While these conflicts still need to be addressed and resolved, they are not deemed bullying.

On Friday, 20 March, St Monica's will take part in the National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence.

Safety—Carpark

Parents are requested to use caution in the afternoons when you are collecting your child. If you are parking in the car park and walking into the school grounds only enter via the gate beside the hall.

Walking through our double gates when cars are leaving the school grounds places your child and yourself in a dangerous situation.

Speed Humps

Three speed humps will be installed in the car park within the next few days. One speed hump will be at the entrance at Daking Street, another alongside the Kiss and Drop gate and the last speed hump will be just before the internal pedestrian crossing.

As there is provision for two lanes of traffic <u>please have your child exit only from the driver's side of the vehicle</u>. Alternatively, parents can park and walk their child onto the school grounds.

NAPLAN

The 2015 NAPLAN tests will be conducted over three days from **Tuesday 12 – Thursday 14 May, 2015**. For students in Year 3 and 5, there are four tests covering:

- ♦ numeracy
- reading
- writing and language conventions (spelling, punctuation and grammar).

School A to Z

School A to Z <u>http://www.schoolatoz.nsw.edu/home</u> have many helpful tips for parents (and teachers) across a wide range of topics related to student learning.

Talking and Listening skills are a constant focus within all learning groups. Being able to take in information, respond to instructions and share ideas, thoughts and opinions are vital skills for children to succeed in life.

The following tips may assist parents in developing and reinforcing talking and listening at home.

- Avoid interrupting your child when they are talking and listen carefully to what they have to say.
- Use everyday opportunities to talk with and listen to your child as they share things that are of interest or importance to them.
- Show your child you are interested in what they are saying by giving nods, smiles, supportive words and gestures. The positive feedback helps reinforce to your child that what he/she says is important and worthwhile.
- If your child has trouble remembering things said, it's a good idea to encourage them to repeat in their mind what has been said, and then retell it in their own words. Making notes can help if they have to do a task.
- If you are planning something such as a party or an outing, try having a brainstorming session with your child. You can do this just by listening and sharing ideas or by writing them down together.
- Discuss dates on a family calendar such as public holidays, weekends and have your child mark in important events.
- From the calendar, talk about days, months and years in relation to events such as birthdays and other occasions.
- When walking or travelling together, talk about street names and the meaning of a displayed sign. You could also discuss anything known about names and signs encountered (eg give an explanation about how street names may have come about.)




High School Enrolment Information

Good News! Stolen Computers Arrest

Two charged after more than 800 computers stolen from schools

Two men have been charged after more than 800 computers were stolen from schools across NSW. A three-month police operation – code-named Strike Force Clementine – has been targeting people responsible for the theft of computer equipment from more than 20 schools in the north-west and southern suburbs of Sydney, the Southern Highlands and Illawarra.

Police believe the same organised syndicate committed 36 aggravated break-ins on stealing computers worth about \$500,000.

Police will allege the Macbooks and iPads were then on-sold via online sales websites and pawn shops. Strike Force Clementine investigators raided a business in Kings Cross last month and recovered 176 computers that police allege in court were part of the proceeds of the break-ins.

As part of the on-going operation, police have now arrested two men who they allege were part of the organised syndicate.

Police believe the group targeted private schools from Kiama to Kellyville.

About 8.15am yesterday (Thursday 19 February 2015), a 20-year-old man was arrested at a home in South Windsor.

He was taken to Windsor Police Station where he was charged with 44 offences:

- Aggravated break and enter commit serious indictable offence in company (22 counts)
- Receive/dispose stolen property (21 counts)
- Take part in a criminal group.

It will be alleged this man was involved in break-ins on 22 private schools.

The man was refused bail and will appear in Penrith Local Court today (Friday 20 February 2015).

This follows the arrest and charging of a man about 7am Tuesday (17 February 2015), at a home in Ebenezer.

This 20-year-old man was taken to Windsor Police Station where he was charged with 26 offences:

- Aggravated break and enter commit serious indictable offence in company (13 counts)
- Receive/dispose stolen property (12 counts)
- Participate criminal group contribute criminal activity.

He was bail refused to Penrith Local Court on Wednesday 18 February 2015. At this appearance the man was again remanded in custody, to re-appear in Penrith Local Court on Friday 27 February 2015.

It will be alleged this man was involved in break-ins on 12 private schools.

Strike Force Clementine comprises officers from the North West Metropolitan Region Enforcement Squad (RES) and Operation Countdown.

Investigations are continuing.
