Monica's Matters

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Dear Parents, Staff and Students,

This week is Refugee Week! During this week we are encouraged to reflect on those who come to our shores as refugees and asylum seekers.

Until 1951 there was no commonly accepted term for people fleeing persecution. People who fled their country were known as stateless people, migrants or refugees. Different countries treated these people in different ways. Following the mass migrations caused by the Second World War (particularly in Europe) it was decided that there needed to be a common understanding of which people needed protection and how they should be protected.

The 1951 Convention relating to the Status of Refugees and it's 1967 Protocol (commonly known as the Refugee Convention), to which Australia is a signatory, defines a refugee as:

Any person who, owing to a well-founded fear of being persecuted for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group or political opinion, is outside the country of his/her nationality and is unable, or owing to such fear, is unwilling to avail himself/herself of the protection of that country.

The Refugee Convention definition is used by the Australian Government to determine whether our country has protection obligations towards asylum seekers. If an asylum seeker is found to be a refugee, Australia is obliged under international law to offer protection and to ensure that the person is not sent back unwillingly to their country of origin.

As Australians let us celebrate and welcome our refugees and celebrate the positive contributions to Australian society made over the past 64 years by the 800,000 Australians who once were refugees.

We were very fortunate yesterday to have Maeve Brown from Arrupe Place, a Jesuit Refugee Centre in Parramatta, speak to our students about the wonderful work they are doing for refugees and asylum seekers. On a weekly basis the centre assists over 150 families with food, clothing and bedding. In addition they also offer cooking classes and English lessons.

Thank you to all the families in the school that have been able to send in donations for Arrupe Place. Mr Dennis will deliver these items to the centre.



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In all the learning spaces this week the teachers have been raising awareness about the issues affecting refugees and celebrating the positive contributions made by refugees to Australian society.

A Prayer for Refugees Almighty and merciful God, whose Son became a refugee and had no place to call his own; look with mercy on those who today are fleeing from danger, homeless and hungry. Bless those who work to bring them relief; inspire generosity and compassion in all our hearts; and guide the nations of the world towards that day when all will rejoice in your Kingdom of justice and of peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

SEMESTER ONE REPORTS

Tomorrow all parents will receive their child's first semester report. These reports are one way of communicating to you about your child's learning achievements and challenges. Parent/Teacher Interviews provide an important opportunity to focus on your child's learning, identifying areas of strength and areas of development for your child as well as setting future short and long term goals for Semester Two. It is encouraged and most beneficial for ALL students to participate in the interview or at least part of it.

MAKING SENSE OF YOUR CHILD'S REPORT

The reporting format is reflective of the Board of Studies Common Grade Scale. The E - A grading scale is from Year 1 – Year 6 only. Kindergarten students will receive a report, showing achievement against a criterion which is more appropriate at this stage of their development.

The Year 1-6 report indicates the extent to which the student demonstrates **Knowledge** and **Skills** not **Work Habits** and **Attitudes**.

A 'C' grade will indicate that your child is progressing at a grade appropriate level and is to be congratulated on their achievements in Semester 1.

COMMON GRADE SCALE

Е

A student awarded an E grade has **elementary knowledge** and understanding in a few areas of the content and has achieved very limited competence in some of the processes and skills. The student requires assistance by a teacher to complete the task

D

A student awarded a 'D' grade has **basic knowledge and understanding** of the content and has achieved a limited level of achievement. The student requires some additional assistance to complete tasks.

С

The most common grade is the 'C' grade. A C grade indicates that the student is achieving at the expected grade level and to their capabilities. A student awarded a 'C' grade has sound knowledge and understanding of the main areas of content and has achieved a satisfactory level of competence in the processes and skills. The student is working at grade level, meeting expectations for the grade, producing quality work samples.

B

A student awarded a 'B' grade has a **thorough knowledge and understanding of the content and skills.** The student is able to apply this knowledge and these skills to most situations. The student is working above grade level, is very capable, above average and is exceeding school benchmarks/expectations for their grade level.

A

A student awarded an 'A' grade has an **extensive knowledge and understanding** of the content and can readily apply this knowledge. The student is achieving <u>well beyond grade level</u>, uses complex language structures, higher order thinking skills, applies skills to new situations, applies knowledge- makes connections, possesses a wide variety of strategies and internalises concepts

Before the Interview

Be Prepared

- Plan and write down your specific questions before the interview
- Identify factors the teacher (s) need to be aware of
- Talk with your child before the interview and ask him/her if there is anything in particular he/she would like raised at the interview
- Is there anything about your child that you think the teacher should know?
- Does your child have worries/ concerns about school you want to raise?
- What does your child like about school?
- Are you concerned about a particular area of learning such as reading, mathematics or social skills?
- Sometimes things change at home for example, change of job, change in living or working arrangements, sudden grief situation. These are important things for teachers to know so that they may be of support for your child/children.

Punctuality

- Be on time
- · Each interview will be in your child's learning space
- At the conclusion of your 15 minute interview a buzzer will sound

During the Interview

Attitude

- Approach the interview with a positive and relaxed attitude
- See it as an opportunity for a two- way conversation in which there is a sharing of information, ideas and concerns.
- Set the scene for a positive and constructive meeting by using open and positive body language -avoid 'defensive postures'

Communication

- Respect the Teacher's professional skills and expertise
- Use respectful behaviours
- Be constructive
- Discuss issues without becoming personal
- Express your needs and concerns calmly
- Remember you both want what's best for your child

Listen

- The best communicators are keen listeners
- Clarify points not completely understood
- If you don't understand the 'jargon' ask for meaning
- Ask your prepared questions

After the Interview

- Follow up on matters discussed
- \cdot Discuss the meeting with your child and talk about his/her strengths and CELEBRATE these
- Ask your child where improvements can be made
- Negotiate a plan with your child that encourages them to take responsibility for their own learning
- Follow up on recommendations of the teacher eg recommendations of books, a better study arrangement etc
- Finally, give the teacher feedback and remember that you are encouraged to be in contact with your child's teacher at any time throughout the year.


LOST PROPERTY

KISS AND DROP—REMINDER

Parents are able to "Kiss and Drop" children to school in the mornings.
