Early Stage 1:

Unit #1: A Community that celebrates God's Love

Students will *identify* times when they join with their Church family to celebrate, *locate* and explain the use or purpose of key features of the parish church, describe some of the key tasks involved in the ministry of the parish priest(s) and *list* some of the major ways in which parishioners serve and support others in the parish.

Stage 1:

Unit #1: Reconciliation: Belonging to a Forgiving Community

Students will describe how their choices affect their relationships with God and others, explain how God is like the shepherd and the woman who lost her coin, make links between their experiences of reconciliation and the elements of the sacrament of Reconciliation and appreciate that they experience God's forgiveness in the Church's celebration of the sacrament of Reconciliation.

Unit #2: Eucharist: Celebrating God's Love Students will identify and explain reasons why family and friends celebrate special meals with each other, identify and explain reasons why Jesus celebrated special meals with others, especially at the Last Supper, describe ways in which Jesus is present in the Church's celebration of the Eucharist revealing God's wonderful love and identify ways in which they and their families can celebrate Sunday as a holy day, especially through their celebration of the Eucharist.

Stage 2 (Year 3):


Unit #1: Caring for God's Wondrous Creation

Students will recognise and appreciate the beauty and wonder of God's creation, grow in awareness of the need to care and take responsibility for God's creation and compose psalms of praise in which they celebrate and give thanks for God's creation.

Stage 2 (Year 4):

Unit #1: God's Forgiveness and HealingStudents will *appreciate* that sometimes in

Sharing Our Story

Sharing Our Story is the document used in The Diocese of Parramatta to guide the teaching of Religion in our Catholic schools. The units explore Bible scripture, Jesus' mission, sacraments and Church teaching. Each Stage works with material that is relevant to the needs of its learners, using resources that engage and support understanding and connect students with the core learning of Catholic Faith.

Unit #2: The Bible: A Special Book

Students will categorise books that vary in purpose, form and audience, locate given biblical references and identify major biblical text types, research biblical accounts of significant people and key events, interpret the message of selected Bible passages for their own lives and explain why Christians revere the Bible, especially the Gospels, and how this is shown in the celebration of the liturgy.

Stage 3:

Unit #1: Sacraments of Service

Students will *describe* how married couples and priests serve their communities, *analyse* the meaning of key symbols and ritual actions within the celebration of the sacraments of Marriage and Holy Orders **and** *describe and reflect on* the nature and responsibilities of the Christian vocation stemming from Baptism.

Unit #2: Stewards of Creation

Students will recognise that the beauty and wonder of creation reflects God, recall Aboriginal sacred stories which explain the beginnings of creation, appreciate that everything they do is significant and affects God's creation and plan a prayer celebration to give thanks for the beauty of God's creation and for the many ways it enriches their lives.

The Driving Question the students will be working on is: *How can we, as Stewards of God's creation, ensure our planet is cared for through our significant actions and responsibilities?*

The Assumption

The Assumption of the Virgin Mary has been commemorated since the early sixth century by the Catholic Church. The church embraced this event as a holy day of obligation to honour the assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The Assumption was when the Virgin Mary was taken up in to heaven body and soul. The reason why this occurred was because Our Lady's body was too sacred to be left on earth, so Mary ascended into Heaven. This holy feast day is celebrated on the 15th of August and is a holy day of obligation.

One tradition that many countries follow during the Assumption is the bringing of flowers and herbs to church for a blessing. In some cultures it is popular to wear blue to the mass in honour of Our Lady. Blue represents truth and clarity, which is also the colour of the sky and symbolises Heaven. It is also a tradition for the song 'Ave Maria' to be sung on this special day. In the words of Pope Francis on the feast day of the assumption " Mary mother of God, pray for us sinners, and guide us on the way that leads to Heaven".

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Mary MacKillop was born in 1842 in Melbourne. She was working as a governess when she met Father Julian Woods. Mary worked in unison with Father Julian Woods to achieve the dream they shared of establishing Catholic education in South Australia. Mary opened a school in an unused stable to meet the growing needs of her local community in 1866. The school laid the foundations of Catholic education in Australia and later became St Joseph's School. Students who went to this school learnt basic life skills as well as religion. The school educated those who were able to pay fees and those who weren't because Mary MacKillop believed that everyone should have a right to access Catholic education no matter how much money they had.

At the age of 24, Mary truly dedicated her life to God and became the first Sister and Mother Superior of the Sisters of Saint Joseph of the Sacred Heart. Official recognition of the Sisters took many years, but in 1867 a decree from Rome constituted the Sisters of Saint Joseph of the Sacred Heart as an approved regular congregation, based in Sydney. The work of these Sisters continued to develop and flourish and has reached out to thousands of communities in Australia and around the world.

The Mary MacKillop International Mission Inc began a ministry in Timor Leste in 1993. This ministry is carried out by people who recognise what Mary MacKillop shared with the world. She upheld people's dignity and educated the poor, while relying on God to provide for her.

Religious Literacy Assessment (RLA)

The Religious Literacy Assessment project, managed within the Evangelisation and Religious Education Service Area provides, at a diocesan level, a sustained and systemic approach to the documentation and reporting of students' learning in the key learning area of Religious Education (RE), specifically religious literacy. Celebrating and sharing the good news about students' learning in RE is an important component of this initiative and enables the story to be told on a continuing basis.

Being religiously literate requires children within a Catholic school to be able to communicate with and be at home in Catholic society and religion in general. Thus, assessment of religious literacy focuses on students' knowledge and understanding of the key concepts that are being addressed by the RE program and the student's ability to communicate within their religious tradition.

The Religious Literacy Assessment is placed in Year 4, at the end of Stage 2, Year 6, at the end of Stage 3 and in Year 8 at the end of Stage 4. Its intention is to influence learning and accountability and drive a culture of reflection on learning and pedagogy in the domain of RE.

The RLA will take place at St Monica's between the 17 August and 4 September. Year 4 will be working on two components to their RLA, a practical 'hands-on' project in response to their scripture they have been studying, as well as an online component in Week 8. Year 6 will complete the online component only during Week 7.
