
Editorial from our Christ-centred Leaders

8 December 2015 - 20 November 2016

"It will be a Holy Year of Mercy" – Pope Francis

The ritual opening of the Holy Door of Mercy in the Basilica of St. Peter, December 8, 2015, marks the official start of the Jubilee of Mercy. From that moment, in every Catholic Church in every diocese, the faithful are called to celebrate and live the Jubilee, particularly through the liturgy. Please find below the official Mercy Prayer to share with your families during this important time:

Lord Jesus Christ.

you have taught us to be merciful like the heavenly Father,

and have told us that whoever sees you sees Him.

Show us your face and we will be saved.

Your loving gaze freed Zacchaeus and Matthew from being enslaved by money;

the adulteress and Magdalene from seeking happiness only in created things;

made Peter weep after his betrayal,

and assured Paradise to the repentant thief.

Let us hear, as if addressed to each one of us, the words that you spoke to the Samaritan woman:

"If you knew the gift of God!"

You are the visible face of the invisible Father,

of the God who manifests his power above all by forgiveness and mercy:

let the Church be your visible face in the world, its Lord risen and glorified.

You willed that your ministers would also be clothed in weakness

in order that they may feel compassion for those in ignorance and error:

let everyone who approaches them feel sought after, loved, and forgiven by God.

Send your Spirit and consecrate every one of us with its anointing,

so that the Jubilee of Mercy may be a year of grace from the Lord,

and your Church, with renewed enthusiasm, may bring good news to the poor,

proclaim liberty to captives and the oppressed,

and restore sight to the blind.

We ask this of you, Lord Jesus, through the intercession of Mary, Mother of Mercy; you who live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit forever and ever.

In Religious Education in 2015, each stage has been implementing our school formation goal 'to deepen our understanding of different prayer forms'. Social Justice: St Vinnie's Christmas Hamper Appeal

Our St Vincent de Paul Christmas Appeal will begin on Monday 30 November. We will be collecting a range of <u>non-perishable</u> items that will be donated to St Vincent de Paul and used to make hampers. These Christmas hampers will be donated to families in our community who are less fortunate, so they have the opportunity to celebrate Christmas with their families and friends.

We would like to ask that every child donates at least one non-perishable item to the Christmas hamper in their classroom. Some food suggestions include tinned food (vegetables, fruit, baked beans, tuna, etc), pasta, cereal, jam, soup, noodles, bottles or drink or juice, or anything else that has a long expiry date.

The hampers will be donated to the St Vincent de Paul who will then distribute where needed.

WYD Fundraiser

We will be holding a fundraiser on Friday 27 November, to raise funds for all the pilgrims in our parish who are travelling to the Philippines and Poland next year for World Youth Day. Millions of young Catholics from across the globe will join Pope Francis in Krakow, Poland for World Youth Day in July next year. One itinerary will take us via the Philippines to work with young people devastated by an earthquake 18 months ago. The other will re-trace the footsteps of Saint John Paul II through Poland. On this afternoon students will have the opportunity to purchase ice blocks (50c), lolly bags (50c) and novelty toys (50c). The afternoon will begin at 2:20pm and commence at 3:00pm.

Stage 2 - Christmas Colours (red, green & white)


Stage 3 Girls - White clothing

The Nativity

A Christmas nativity is probably one of the most recognisable symbols of the Christmas season. The word nativity is taken from the Latin nativus, which means "arisen by birth". Nativities are art, models, carvings, or live demonstrations depicting the night of Jesus' birth. These scenes generally contain the same elements: the Christ child in a manger; His mother, Mary; His earthly father, Joseph; shepherds; angels; various barn animals; and sometimes three wise men. Saint Francis of Assisi created the very first nativity scene in 1223 in an effort to promote the true meaning of Christmas and worship of Jesus Christ. His idea caught on, and soon a
